PRESIDENT'S CHRISTMAS MESSAGE

That year is fast slipping away! I have discovered that the role is multi-layered and that supporting my chosen charity is only one of those layers.

Looking towards Christmas, I want to thank Paul Donaghy for taking on the task of organising our Christmas lunch. I am looking forward to that event. Paul has also been active setting up visits for us to join. During the year so far, a group of us had a tour around the new Everard's brewery at Fosse Park and, more recently, a trip to the John Deere facility at Langar in Nottinghamshire.

There is no doubt that the great challenge for Rotary Clubs today is to build their membership amongst the age group that formed so many clubs in the past, that is the 30s and 40s. It is, of course, a different world now and the traditional club is appealing to some but not all. So, what have we, Leicester Club Rotarians, done so far this year? Here are just some of our activities:

- ♦ In support of the End Polio Now campaign we have planted crocuses across sites in the city and made a donation of £600 to the campaign.
- We have supported the charity Vista in harvesting their collection boxes around the city and David Howard has managed the Leicestershire clubs to do the same across the county.
- Richard Power has done his epic cycle ride to raise money for Sappers Support and my president's charity, FOCUS.
- The Impact Group held a very successful quiz and a curry night, raising funds for food poverty and building links into the community.
- ♦ The £16,000+ funds raised by Grace Drane for Ukrainian refugees has been despatched to Poland following finalising the background process development.
- At the moment we are raising funds (thanks for all your donations) for the Christmas hampers and preparing to buy food and pack the hampers for distribution. Rotaractors will be helping there.
- ♦ And we are all set to support Age UK with their Christmas lunch, as we have done for many years.

I realise that I have selectively named names, but it is all the members of the Club that go to making it successful and I thank you all for your support. On that note, I look forward to what we will be doing in the rest of my term. I wish you and your families a Happy Christmas and a peaceful 2023 and a successful year for the Club.

FROM WORLD POLIO DAY ON 24 OCTOBER 2022

In 1986 when Rotary International gave a commitment to rid the world of <u>this terrible decease</u> it was endemic in all but a handful of countries worldwide.

Rotary's campaign was joined by The World Heath Organization, the Centre for Disease Control and UNICEF amongst others.

We have done well in clearing the world except the area of the Afghanistan/Pakistan Border but we have always feared that the disease is only a flight away. Following COVID, these fears have been realised as the wild Polio Virus has been found in the London sewers and we know of an actual case recently occurring in New York.

To support the eradication Programme, all Rotarians are asked to donate and for members the best way to do this is a contribution to our Club charity account (30-94-97 02722147) including "Polio" as the reference.

This is a good time to donate because it has just been reconfirmed that the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation will add two pounds for every pound donated by Rotarians. So if you are able to donate £25, with Gift Aid this will provide £62.50 to fund the vaccination programme.

To promote the End Polio Now campaign our President Nick arranged the planting of purple crocuses in three locations this year. The purple crocus is used because the little finger of children given the vaccine are painted purple in order to prevent them receiving a second dose.

Rotary can be proud of the leading role it has played in one of the greatest public health success stories of all time as polio will become only the second human disease to be eradicated from the world, after smallpox.
